1. Vote-By-Mail

Request to Vote-By-Mail
A vote-by-mail ballot request may be made in person, by mail, by email, by phone, or online via the website VoteIndianRiver.com.
Wednesday, October 31, 2018 is the last day to request a vote-by-mail ballot to be mailed for the General Election.
Voted ballots must be received by the Supervisor of Elections office no later than 7:00 p.m. on Election Day in order to be counted.
Vote-By-Mail Ballot Drop Boxes
Completed vote-by-mail ballots may also be delivered to any one of the three early voting locations during voting hours.



It is a felony to vote in a precinct in which you do not reside.
Address changes within the state of Florida may be processed at any time, including Election Day at the polls. Voters who wait to update their address on Election Day may have a slight delay in voting and may also be directed to another polling place based on the voter's new residence address.


The Indian River County voting system uses an optical scanner to read your ballot. Please completely fill in the oval. Any other mark may not be read by the scanner.

No. 1 Constitutional Amendment, Article VII, Section 6, Article XII, Section 37		
Increased Homestead Property Tax Exemption Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to increase the homestead exemption by exempting the assessed valuation of homestead property greater than \$100,000 and up to \$125,000 for all levies other than school district levies. No. 2 Constitutional Amendment, Article XII, Section 27	Rights of Crime Victims; Judges Creates constitutional rights for victims of crime; requires courts to facilitate victims' rights; authorizes victims to enforce their rights throughout criminal and juvenile justice processes. Requires judges and hearing officers to independently interpret statutes and rules rather than deferring to government agency's interpretation. Limitations on Property Tax Assessments Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to permanently retain provisions currently in effect, which limit property tax assessment increases on specified nonhomestead real property, except for school district taxes, to 10 percent each year. No. 3 Constitutional Amendment, Article X, Section 29		
Voter Control of Gambling in Florida This amendment ensures that Florida voters shall have the exclusive right to decide whether to authorize casino gambling by requiring that in order for casino gambling to be authorized under Florida law, it must be approved by Florida voters pursuant to Article XI, Section 3 of the Florida Constitution. Affects articles X and XI. Defines casino gambling and clarifies that this amendment does not conflict with federal law regarding state/tribal compacts. 	First Responder and Military Member Survivor Benefits; Public Colleges and Universities Grants mandatory payment of death benefits and waiver of certain educational expenses to qualifying survivors of certain first responders and military members who die performing official duties. Requires supermajority votes by university trustees and state university system board of governors to raise or impose all legislatively authorized fees if law requires approval by those bodies. No. 4 Constitutional Amendment, Article VI, Section 4		
Voting Restoration Amendment This amendment restores the voting rights of Floridians with felony convictions after they complete all terms of their sentence including parole or probation. The amendment would not apply to those convicted of murder or sexual offenses, who would continue to be permanently barred from voting unless the Governor and Cabinet vote to restore their voting rights on a case by case basis. The precise effect of this amendment on state and local government costs cannot be determined, but the operation of current voter registration laws, combined with an increased number of felons registering to vote, will produce higher overall costs relative to the processes in place today. The impact, if any, on state and local government revenues cannot be determined. When:

There is a significant change in your signature or identifying "mark".

ID Requirement

Florida Statute 101.043, requires voters to provide valid photo and signature I.D. to vote. If you do not have valid identification, you may vote a provisional ballot.
